

Setting up the Room

Suggested meeting room arrangement is chairs arranged in a block for the first part of the presentation, with the tables arranged around the room behind you. All the stations except the read station should have access from 2 sides if possible to allow more elbow room for crafts.

Presentation Talking points

You should plan for an approximately 15 minute presentation – or two minutes per station plus a couple more on brain development and questions. If you have a very small group, you may wish to take them station by station and do a more informal presentation as you move through each station.

Ice Breakers

• Help the parents break the ice with one another at the very start by introducing themselves and their child, and saying one thing they like that starts with the letter of their name (or their child's) – Ex: My name is Kathleen, and my son's name is Klaus... and we both like Kite Festivals!

Brain Talking Points

- Babies are born with 100 billion brain cells (neurons) more than adults (~85b)
- During the first 2 years of life, they make a lot of connections! (super highway color purple example)
- WHY: But they also prune about 20% of those whatever they aren't using... so use it or lose it!

Read Talking Points

- WHY: Opportunity to engage, explore new vocabulary, thoughts, and feelings
- Read with enthusiasm but also with intentional interaction (paper or ebooks)
- Find words in the world around you
- Label things at home
- Store books within reach
- If you want to raise a reader, be a reader encourage your child to ask questions about what you are reading and offer simple retellings of the stories you are reading to them

Write Talking Points

- WHY: Scribbling develops motor skills needed for writing
- Develops awareness about print conveying meaning
- Give many opportunities for developing fine motor skills (play-doh, scissors, different writing implements, surfaces, & angles)

Sing Talking Points

- WHY: Slows down words breaks them into syllables, memory & comprehension aid, rhyming helps with predicting, and it's attention grabbing yet soothing (serotonin)
- Make songs your own and make them fun
- Use songs everywhere transitions, de-stressing a situation
- Sing songs from childhood or that are your favorites today
- Good singing voice not required!
- Percussion instruments are satisfying accompaniments because they help release endorphins & serotonin

Talk Talking Points

- WHY: Parent and caregiver engagement through speech is essential for brain development especially speech development, which will later play a role in reading
- Make it a priority to find ways to talk to your child even when they are pre-verbal
- Ask and answer questions especially open ended ones
- Retell favorite stories together & make up new ones
- Have children tell you the story of their drawings & you can write it at the bottom

- Play I Spy / Veo Veo but switch it up: try using rhyming words, or things that start with the letter ___
- Take a book Walk with a wordless picture book, an old favorite, or a simple ABC book!

Play Talking Points

- WHY: Pulls all of the 5 best practices together in one vehicle reading (storytelling) writing singing and talking!
- Many skills developed during play (fine and gross motor, storytelling skill, talking, imagination, problem solving)
- Don't need fancy toys a cardboard box or a pile of old clothes & hats can spark a little imagination
- Try family storytelling with your older child go around the table at dinner with each person providing the next line in a story you tell as a group
- Don't be afraid to be silly, and use play wherever you go especially when waiting in line! (Head to Toe)
- Remember: Anything can be a costume... or a puppet! This TP tube could be a telescope, or a tiara, or a secret message, or an important scroll, or a magic potion bottle! The possibilities are endless!
