

HISTORY

In 1925, Grace Delano Clark persuaded the Austin Branch of the American Association of University Women to take on the project of establishing a library for Austin. In February of 1926, the Austin Public Library opened in a rented room on Congress Avenue with 500 donated volumes. Clark served as the volunteer librarian. By December of 1926, the first Austin Public Library building, measuring 1,800 sq. ft., opened at West 9th and Guadalupe Streets at a cost of \$4,190. The building later moved to become the first branch of the Library, and it is now part of the Carver Museum complex.

In 1933, a second 36,000 sq. ft. structure replaced the original one at a cost of \$145,000, and Darthula Wilcox was appointed the first Library Director. The building currently serves as the Austin History Center. In 1944, Mary Rice became the second Director of the Austin Public Library, in 1967, David Earl Holt the third and in 1991, Brenda Branch the fourth. In 1979, the current Central Library opened adjacent to the 1933 structure with 110,000 square feet at a cost of \$6 million. In 1995, the City Council voted to rename the Central Library after John Henry Faulk, a well-known Austin writer and humorist.

On November 7, 2006, Austin voters overwhelmingly approved Bond Proposition 6 to build a New Central Library. On December 11, 2008, City Council selected Lake/Flato Architects and Shepley Bulfinch to design the new Central Library on the Seaholm Substation site, 710 W. César Chávez St. The groundbreaking took place on May 30, 2013. It is projected to open in the spring of 2017.

- The Austin Public Library has 20 branches, the Faulk Central Library, the Austin History Center and the Recycled Reads used bookstore.
- 542,358 people are registered card holders.
- The collection comprises 1,725,535 items systemwide.
- Customers visited the Austin Public Library 3,091,649 times last fiscal year and checked out a total of 5,572,268 items.
- 21,041 volunteer hours were donated throughout the Library system in 2014/2015.
- 23,468,874 virtual visits were made to Austin Public Library's website in 2014/2015.
